What is Health Information Exchange?


Health Information Exchange is any of several technologies that allow you to share patient data from your EHR with other providers and health plans, and for you to receive or access data from those sources, electronically.

HIE can support:

- Operational efficiencies
- Access to patient histories for diagnosis and treatment
- Active collaboration with other providers in new care models
 - -- Health Homes, DSRIP, ACOs, bundled payments, etc.

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Drivers for HIE

Perform under New Models of Care

- Risk Contracts and Coordinated Care Models
- Health Homes, ACOs, DSRIP

Meet Meaningful Use Requirements

- Send Summary of Care Document, using DIRECT
- Perform medications reconciliation
- Provide patients with access to their data
- Maintain current problems/meds/allergies
- Submit data to Public Health Registries

Support Public Policy Goals

- Better Outcomes at Lower Cost
- Patients' Access to Their Data
- Public Health Uses



Benefits to FQHCs

- <u>Transitions of Care</u> Receive and send referral orders, transfer forms, and plans of care as patients move among providers, including between FQHCs, Hospitals, Nursing Homes, and Home Care.
- Be notified immediately when the patient enters an ED or hospital.
- Access the patient's clinical data to see the patient's medical history and previous treatment by other providers, to guide diagnosis and treatment, and improve care.
- Collaborate with ACOs, Hospitals, DSRIP programs, other partners.
- Analytic Reporting to evaluate and improve outcomes.
- In emergency or disaster, public health authority can see if a missing person has been admitted to a hospital or nursing home.




HIE Services

HIE supports patient care and coordination:


- With patient consent, you can view the patient's data from all providers in the RHIO – through the RHIO's portal or through many EHRs.
- With patient consent, the RHIO can notify you when the patient is admitted to ED or Inpatient services at any hospital in the RHIO (Clinical Event Notifications, or CENs).
- Other users can view data submitted from your
 EHR, if they have received the patient's consent.
- In 2015, your RHIO will provide access to data from the other RHIOs in New York State.
- You can send and receive Direct Secure Messages to and from any provider who uses the national Direct standard in your RHIO, in New York, or anywhere in the US.



EHR Interoperability







State Health Information Network – New York

- 10 RHIOs across New York State will connect with each other through the SHIN-NY
 - Receive State funding and comply with State regulations on security, privacy, and services provided
 - Certified by New York State as Qualified Entities (QEs);
 will be audited for meeting all requirements in Q2 2015
 - Patient consent is required for providers or health plans to access data -- except for emergency access by providers
 - RHIOs are adopting interoperable technology standards
 - NYS DOH has designated the New York eHealth Collaborative (NYeC) to facilitate the SHIN-NY
- SHIN-NY will connect to HealtheWay, the national exchange



Costs and Funding to Connect to a RHIO


- There is no annual fee for "dial tone" services in a RHIO
- The FQHC may incur one-time costs to connect to a RHIO:
 - To reimburse its EHR vendor costs vary by EHR
 - To reimburse the RHIO costs vary by RHIO
- CMS/DOH incentive funding may be available -- up to \$30,000 for an FQHC connecting to a RHIO by Sep 30, 2015
 - \$10,000 for joining the RHIO and contributing 5 of 7 clinical data elements

Demographics, Encounters, Labs, Allergies, Medications, Procedures, Diagnoses

- \$20,000 for activating the FQHC's Eligible Providers (EPs)
 \$500 per EP for up to 40 EPs, to a maximum of \$20,000
- NYC DOHMH incentives for FQHCs using eCW




New York's Investment in the SHIN-NY

RHIOs in New York State are adopting common standards to exchange data in the State Health Information Network – New York







Participation in the SHIN-NY






Patients Providing Consent in the SHIN-NY





About Healthix
