

Maintain the Executive Budget's Proposed \$54.4 Million for the Diagnostic and Treatment Center (D&TC) Uncompensated Care Pool

Policy Request

To ensure that the most vulnerable New Yorkers are able to access care, we urge the Legislature to:

Maintain the Executive Budget's proposed \$54.4 million for the Diagnostic and Treatment Center (D&TC) Uncompensated Care Pool.

Background:

The D&TC Uncompensated Care Pool provides funding to health centers for services provided to uninsured patients. FQHCs are **New York State's primary care safety net**, but they are **struggling under the financial burden of providing care for the uninsured** because of the low reimbursement they receive for serving these patients.

- According to our mission and our mandate, FQHCs are only located in designated underserved communities, and they provide access to primary and preventive health care regardless of insurance status or ability to pay.
- Though we try hard to ensure that people are enrolled in health insurance plans,
 23% of health center patients are uninsured—a 6.5% increase over the past
 5 years.
- FQHCs play a critical role in caring for newly-insured patients, while at the same time serving as the primary care safety net for the uninsured.
- **FQHCs serve those most in need.** Our patients are likely to represent: Medicaid, uninsured, low-income, and/or ethnic and racial minority populations.

The D&TC Uncompensated Care Pool uses a simple, transparent formula to assess "uncompensated care need."

The "need" is calculated by multiplying the number of "self-pay" or uninsured visits by a facility's Medicaid rate. The sum the facility received to offset the visits is subtracted from that amount to derive a number representing "need" or losses.

The more uninsured care a FQHC provides, the greater proportion of the pool the FQHC receives.
