

Expanding and Sustaining Federally Qualified Health Centers (FQHC) Across New York State

FQHCs are Vital to the Development of High-Performing Primary Care

- FQHCs are not-for-profit, community-based providers located in medically underserved areas.
- They provide high quality, cost-effective, patient-centered primary and preventive health services to anyone seeking care, regardless of their insurance status or ability to pay.
- There is a **primary care shortage** across many regions of New York State.
- FQHCs are critical to creating high-performing primary care networks across New York and are central to state and federal health reform strategies.

Policy Requests:

1. The Expansion and Sustainability of Internal and Physical Capacity

Increased Access to Affordable Capital

- We support the Governor's \$1.2 billion appropriation for health care capital investment.
- Primary care safety net providers should receive a substantial portion of the annual distributions to expand primary care in New York from the \$1.2 billion in capital funds proposed in the Governor's budget.
- Primary care expansion requires access to affordable capital. Capital funds help providers:
 - build new sites,
 - expand existing sites,
 - · renovate outdated facilities,
 - purchase health information technology, and
 - increase patient access through telemedicine and mobile medical vans.

Expansion of the Health Facility Restructuring Program

This provision allows the Department of Health to work with select providers to access an interest-free loan program to help sustain their services. The expansion will make it possible for D&TCs to access the program, thereby allowing DOH to leverage this resource for FQHCs as well.

Funding for Migrant and Seasonal Health Care Programs

- Support continued funding at previous fiscal year levels (\$430,000) for Migrant Health Care programs across New York State.
- Migrant Health Care funding allows FQHCs and other eligible providers to care for over 18,000 migrant and seasonal agricultural workers and their families, who are important to New York State's farming industry.

2. Primary Care Workforce Recruitment and Retention

Funding for Doctors Across New York (DANY) and the Primary Care Service Corps (PCSC)

- We support the Governor's FY 2014–15 budget proposal for ongoing funding for Doctors Across New York and the Primary Care Service Corps (\$500,000) – public health programs that advance primary care workforce recruitment and retention.
- We also ask for funding for 250 additional annual awards under the DANY program by adding approximately \$8.75 million to the FY 2014-15 budget.
- There is a growing shortage of primary care professionals in many parts of New York State — both in rural communities and urban centers.

3. Community-Level Planning

- Support the proposed FY 2014-15 Executive Budget provision for the Regional Health Improvement Collaboratives (RHICs).
- Community-level planning will support the development of plans that can be implemented at the local level and will be an important complement to regional planning efforts.
- Resources are needed to develop the infrastructure for regional level planning, under the leadership of RHICs.
